



General Provisions, 1995 GAA


SEC. 27. GENDER-RESPONSIVE PROJECTS. All departments, bureaus, offices and agencies shall set aside an amount out of their 1995 appropriations to be used for projects designed to address gender issues in accordance with R.A. No. 7192...


General Provisions, 2011 GAA

SEC. 31. PROGRAMS/PROJECTS RELATED TO GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT. All departments, bureaus, offices, agencies, SUCs, GOCCs, and LGUs shall <u>formulate a Gender and Development (GAD) Plan</u> designed to address gender issues within their concerned sectors or mandate and implement applicable provisions in the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women, the Beijing Platform for Action, the Millennium Development Goals (2000-2015), the Philippine Plan for Gender-Responsive Development (1995-2025), and the Framework plan for Women. The GAD Plan shall be integrated in the regular activities of the agencies, which shall be <u>at least five percent (5%) of their respective budgets.</u>












Implementation Problems
